#### PASTOR'S NOTES

Almost every day since our family has been here, I been asked questions about whether we are settled in our new home, or how we like being here in Whiteville. I have to say that both Claudia and I feel blessed to be here and to begin a new chapter in ministry with our Whiteville UMC Church family. I have to say thank you to everyone for making us feel so welcomed and at home. Thank you also for being patient with our little Jonathan. He is a bundle of energy and thinks the world was built for him to explore.

For my newsletter message I thought it might be good to tell a little about myself and so that we can begin to get to know each other better. One of the things I like to do on my Sabbath day, in my spare time, is to work with pottery. I've been doing this for a few years now and for me, there's just something meaningful about taking something as common as clay (dirt) from the earth, and using it to create something useful, something beautiful, even something that might be used for holy purposes.

The creation story in Genesis teaches that "The LORD God formed a man from the dust of the ground and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and the man became a living being." When I read that passage I have to think that God must have been something of a potter too. Or at least, that one aspect of God's essential nature is to create. "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth." And then when God created humankind and breathed his life into us, I believe part of God's nature was imparted to us. As God said, "Let us make humankind in our image, in our likeness." I believe that we all have in us a spark of God's nature (His image and likeness) that invites us also to be creative. That creativity comes out in different ways, with different people. Sometimes in the work that we do, sometimes in our hobbies, and even sometimes in our day to day chores.

What are some ways that you can see that divine creative spark in your own lives?

Working in pottery is a creative outlet for me but it also fits nicely into my view of theology. How many of you believe that God can take an ordinary person, and form and shape them into something useful, something beautiful, even something that might be used for holy purposes. We all do, right? That's part of why we come to church and Sunday School. We are hoping to be formed and shaped for God's holy purposes. That's exactly how I feel when I sit at the pottery wheel and start to form and shape something beautiful from the 'dust of the ground.'

One of the things I enjoy making the most are communion sets which I can give away to pastors and churches. I remember the first communion chalice I ever made. It was kind of small and pitiful looking, at least compared to my more practiced work, but then we all have to start somewhere. I had formed it with a coil of clay that wrapped around the stem like a vine, and that joined with some grapes and leaves also formed on the cup. Unfortunately, the vine dried out too quick and part of it cracked and fell off. The instructor helped me stick it back on with some glaze and we fired it in the kiln to see what would happen. Unfortunately, the broken piece slid a little and the crack was obvious. Even so, the cup itself was sound and certainly would hold the juice (the blood of Christ) that reminds us of our debt to Jesus. I ended up giving that chalice to a friend of mine who was leaving the ministry to try and save his marriage. I reminded him that God can redeem broken vessels (both human ones and those made of clay) and still use them for holy purposes. Maybe you know some folks out there who are feeling a bit broken and useless. Remind them that God loves all, including the broken, and he is certainly able to redeem all who are willing to surrender to him.

Heavenly Father, By your Spirit make us one with Christ, one with each other, and one in ministry to all the world, until Christ comes in final victory, and we feast at his heavenly banquet. Through your Son Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit in your holy Church, all honor and glory is yours, almighty Father (God), now and for ever. Amen



## STEWARDSHIP REPORT

Thanks to a generous donor at year-end we finished the year with excess offerings of \$7,239. Conference Apportionments were paid in full. Fortunately expenditures were only 90% of the budget, due mainly to the vacant Pastor's position. Offerings in 2022 were \$33,645 less than our 2023 budget, so we will have some pressure to grow this year. Copies of the 2023 budget are available in the Narthex and church office.

Sunday morning attendance averaged 57, the same as last year. Average attendance was slightly better than 2021 when you factor in three 2021 Sunday events that resulted in over 100 in attendance. The events were pre-school and Boy Scouts programs.

The pledge campaign resulted in a disappointing 16 pledges for a total of \$80,180. This is 45% less than last year. Some have said they did not pledge due to the pending disaffiliation issue. Deaths and folks relocating also reduced the response. We need volunteers to assist chairperson, Carlton Williamson, with the 2024 pledge campaign.

January offerings were 10% less than last year. However, average Sunday attendance was 59, up 18 from last January.

A new group for Columbus County, Caregivers Support Group, has been meeting in the Church Parlor the second Thursday of each month at 1:00 since November. See the flyer in this newsletter for details on this group.

A book dispensing machine for Edgewood School is a work in progress as a grant is sought to provide the machine. Vickie Pait is working with Joy Proctor at Edgewood on the best way to apply to the manufacturer for a grant. We may be involved in providing books to stock the machine when it arrives.

Ten "Bedtime Blessing Bags" were donated to the Whiteville Police Department. These are to be immediately available to a child being removed from an unsafe home environment. About 100 children were removed from such situations last year. Each duffle bag contains twin sheets, a blanket, towel and washcloth, a toiletry kit, a bedtime book and a teddy bear. (The UWF shopped for, funded and assembled the bags.)

The Outreach Committee once again sponsored families from our church's Angel Tree to provide Christmas gifts for children.

Due to my brother's illness, it was necessary for me to be in Chapel Hill the better part of this month. Now home, I'm "playing catch-up"! Carolyn Hankins has graciously provided the files she has for the various projects in which the Outreach Committee is involved and/or has supported over the years. The distance between our homes may be great, but our hearts remain closely united. I'm grateful for many things, but I am most thankful for you both.


