PASTOR'S NOTES

Easter People

As I mentioned last Sunday, this time of year (halfway through Lent) I begin to feel a push to get on to Easter and the resurrection. And, I can't help but wonder if Jesus felt that way himself, especially during those last few weeks of his life on earth. Was he in a hurry to "get it over with", or rather did he dread the approaching hour of his crucifixion and death? Perhaps even a little of both? Recently someone asked me if I was ready for Easter. My initial reaction is probably the most honest. No, I'm not. I don't know that I'm ever truly ready. I'm certainly not ready for the days leading up to Easter and the emotional exhaustion that comes with contemplating Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. Moving through the dark days of Holy Week is hard. Recognition that our own sinful nature was responsible for Jesus' crucifixion and death leaves a heavy burden on the hearts of many of us. It doesn't matter that these events took place among a particular group of people, a long time ago. Certainly we would feel more comfortable if we could point our fingers back toward some other people, place, and time, but we are just as culpable. We cannot simply wash our hands, and proclaim ourselves innocent of this blood. The blood of Christ that was shed for us, that cleanses our sin-stained souls, also condemns us for the sinners we are, as certainly as if we'd pounded those nails in ourselves. And yet, by that same blood we know we are saved to a new life in Jesus Christ. And so we must push through. There's no way to get to Easter, to celebrate God's victory over sin and death, without going first to the

Lately there's been some who have questioned whether we (The United Methodist Church) still hold that resurrection is one of the foundational tenets of our faith. The answer is and always will be YES! Just as the apostle Paul once wrote to the Church in Corinth, "If there is no resurrection of the dead, then not even Christ has been raised. And if Christ has not been raised, our preaching is useless and so is your faith." Karl Barth, an esteemed theologian of the 20th Century once said that what brings people to worship is the unspoken question that clings to their hearts and minds, "Is it true?" The question is never so relevant as it is when we approach Easter morning. In a few weeks, Christians around the world will gather in their places of worship to do one thing... to celebrate the risen Christ and share the Good News that brings. The truth is, I think most people have already answered that question in their hearts before they arrive. I think people who come to church these days, and especially on Easter, do so for lots of other reasons. For some, it may be a sense of habit or an obligation to family members. Others seem to enjoy the experience of corporate worship and feel a need to be a part of a community of believers. Perhaps the most important reason we gather, is that we all need to hear the good news again. We need the blessing of Easter to restore our hearts to a joyful condition. We all need to be reminded of that hope we have, that God has made a way for us to be with him through the death and resurrection of his Son, Jesus. When Easter morning has come, we can again breath a deep sigh of relief. 'Yes Karl, it is true.' Jesus did rise, the stone was rolled away, the tomb was empty...or almost empty. Faith, Hope and Love were left behind for all of us who came later. Peace be with us all, my fellow Easter People.

STEWARDSHIP REPORT

To recap 2023, Sunday Morning Worship Service attendance averaged 59, up 2 from 2022. The average, following the disaffiliation vote, was 46. Our offerings and other income were \$3,620 less than our expenses of \$238,071. Other income was substantial and included transfers from the Pridgen Local Missions and the Caroline T. High Preaching endowments, as well as a grant from the Duke Foundation. Many thanks to several members who increased their offerings generously. Conference apportionments were paid in full.

On to 2024, Sunday morning worship attendance for the first two months averaged 45. The Adult Sunday School moved to the cozy church parlor and is enjoying it, especially on these cold Sunday mornings. Please come and join us as Pastor Howard leads us as we explore the book of Genesis.

We began 2024 with a slightly smaller budget. Included in the reduction was the conferences commitment to pay half of the pastor's health insurance and pension expenses. That will save us \$13,288. Additionally, we received a grant of \$7,000 to be applied to our apportionments.

Through February our expenses were \$34,127 and exceeded our offerings by \$5,636. We had funds on hand to cover the shortage. Our offerings through February are only \$2,191 less than last year. Thanks for your support.

The challenge is to match our smaller congregation, and resulting smaller offerings, with our staff salaries and building maintenance. Our payroll and property costs alone exceed \$200,000. We have the resources to continue our programs and missions for a reasonable time, but must grow to continue them at their current level.

Please continue to pray for our church stewardship and be as generous with your participation and offerings as possible. Thank you for your stewardship response to God's faithfulness to us.
