WHAT MADE THE 2019 GENERAL CONFERENCE INEVITABLE

By the time you read this editorial, the 2019 General Conference in St. Louis will be history being written. The delegates will have come to a decision (or not!) on the way forward for The United Methodist Church.

For years, United Methodists have agreed that matters related to human sexuality are only the "presenting issues" in the Church today. To be sure, those presenting issues are important. After all, they are now dividing this denomination (and the denominations).

When we United Methodists speak and write about "presenting issues," we are suggesting there are also "underlying issues." That is, we are suggesting that beneath the obvious disagreements about sexuality are deeper, more foundational disagreements that are rocking and roiling the Church. In what follows, this pastor will briefly describe six (6) claims that are not only a part of historic, ecumenical Christianity but also now disputed by some within the Church (and many outside the Church). Again, challenges of the following foundational matters are shaking The United Methodist Church to its core. But those challenges also offer The United Methodist Church an invitation to grow more fully into the "one holy catholic and apostolic Church" (The Nicene Creed).

Here are the six foundational matters.

1. Truth exists. For the Church, Jesus Christ is the truth. He most fully reveals God to the Church and to the world. All truths in this world relate, in one way or another, to the truth who is Jesus Christ.
2. In the Church, Biblical truth, doctrinal truth, and moral truth (all which aim to keep the Church focused on Jesus Christ, the center of the Church's faith and life) exist. In the Church's unfolding history, due to the leading of the Holy Spirit, Biblical truth and doctrinal truth and moral truth that have already been received by the Church can deepen and mature. Such deepening and maturing of truth involve developing -- never breaking with or reversing -- what has been received in earlier ages, seasons, and days.
3. For the Church's faith and life, and the Christian's faith and life, truth is most fully revealed through Scripture well understood. The truth of the Biblical witness depends upon its "plain meaning" (John Wesley) that is clarified, and strengthened, by the Church's authoritative Tradition (starting with Rev. John Wesley's Notes on the New Testaments and sermons, "The Articles of Religion" and "The Confession of Faith"), reason (including logic, science, and philosophy), and experience (actually, Christian experience).
4. Truth is to be served -- not possessed, not manipulated, never weaponized. Furthermore, the Church proposes truth to people for their good -- never

imposes it upon people for their harm.

5. An essential part of the Christian community's mission -- especially for its bishops and clergy -- is to propose, as winsomely and persuasively as possible, the truth of the Church's faith. Bishops and clergy promise to propose the Church's faith, not their own personal opinions; and they never expect their proposal of the Church's faith to be accepted by all in the Church. Dissent, within the boundaries set by The Book of Discipline, is to be expected, welcomed, engaged, and defended against. But dissent and dissenters should never be allowed to silence the truthful, loving proposal of the Church's faith.

6. The Church and the Christian flourish when they receive, trust, and obey Christian truth (or the Word of God). Often, that truth will appear to be irrelevant, out-of-step with contemporary fashions, against the Church's best interest, and/or too difficult to abide by. But with God's help, all good things -- even those that seem to be most difficult -- are possible.

Whatever the 2019 General Conference decided in February, the recovery of these foundations will require the most thoughtful attention and faithful ministry of The United Methodist Church -- and particularly its bishops and clergy -- for years to come. With God's help, that can and will occur.
