

BISHOP TIM WHITAKER ON THE CHURCH

Back on November 15, Bishop Tim Whitaker spoke on the topic of "The Gospel Truth about Christ's Church for United Methodists." As noted in last month's newsletter, Dr. Warren Smith of Duke Divinity School responded to Bp. Whitaker's presentation. All of this took place in front of a crowd of all kinds of United Methodists at First United Methodist Church in Wilson, NC.

Bp. Whitaker's talk is challenging: The United Methodist Church has an identity crisis, not a unity problem. It is interesting: Methodism seems to have done whatever it took to become popular in American society (by adopting Revivalism in the 1800s) and remain popular (by morphing into Liberal Protestantism in the 1900s and beyond). It is wide-ranging: from the Israel of the Bible to the United Methodism of our day. It is bracing: it calls for a deep reformation of the church, so that "the church [will be] the people called to live as Israel in the world, to be a distinctive people who live an alternate way of life." The bottom line for Bp. Whitaker: The United Methodist Church can and should live in a way that is based on God's revelation, which is received by the People of God; therefore, the church's identity is given by God. Because of that reality, The United Methodist Church does not have to make up itself -- its faith, life, and mission -- as it goes along. Instead, the church's task is simply to trust, and obey, the Lord of all the Church.

N.T. WRIGHT ON LOVE AND KNOWLEDGE

On October 28, N.T. Wright delivered the 2019 Erasmus Lecture at the Union League Club in New York City.

Having served as the Bishop of Durham (Church of England), Wright now chairs New Testament and Early Christianity at the School of Divinity at the University of St. Andrews in Scotland. More than that, he is now one of the great teachers of the entire Church. It could be reasonably claimed that N.T. Wright actually functions like a Protestant Pope.

Initiated in 1985, the annual Erasmus Lecture is sponsored by First Things. Its past lecturers form quite a list of notables. Here are several: Joseph Ratzinger (later Benedict XVI), Mary Ann Glendon (Harvard Law School), Wolfhart Pannenberg (1928-2014, German systematic theologian), Timothy Dolan (Archbishop of New York), Timothy George (Beeson Divinity School), Robert George (Princeton), and Robert Louis Wilken (University of Virginia). N.T. Wright was the thirty-second lecturer in the series.

The title of Wright's lecture was "Loving to Know." The point of Wright's lecture can be stated like so: while the modern world believes that "objectivity" is the best way to knowledge, the Church's faith and natural law contend that loving a subject leads to the deepest knowing of that subject. Throughout his lecture, Wright pokes fun at the

Enlightenment, a style of thinking that minimizes or eliminates the place and power of God in the world.

GEORGE WEIGEL ON NATIONAL INTEREST AND PURPOSE

One more suggestion.

George Weigel -- who wrote *The Book on the life, ministry, and thought of John Paul II (Witness to Hope, 1999)* -- delivered the 2019 Diane Knippers Memorial Lecture on "The National Interest and the National Purpose." This lecture was delivered on November 21 at the headquarters of the Institute on Religion and Democracy in Washington, DC. Since so many corrupted political considerations have been in the nation (and about the nation) these days, on the political left and on the political right, George Weigel's speech was (and remains) especially timely. Furthermore, Weigel's historical review highlights things that were slightly or seldom covered by network news; and his stated principles are very thoughtful.

MEMORABLE

Theodor Haecker wrote *Journal in the Night* (1950) to clarify the truths upon which he based his opposition to the German National Socialism of the 1930s and 1940s. In this book, Haecker noted: "Christ also died for 'barbarians,' but he did not become man as a barbarian, nor did he live among them, or choose his disciples among them. The relapse of civilized nations into barbarism is moreover not possible unless they first abandon Christianity." (*First Things*, December 2019, p. 68)

MISSION-TRIP INVITATION

Red Bird Mission Work Camp is located in Clay County, Kentucky. Due to the closing of the coal mines, it is the poorest county in the United States. Families live without water, plumbing, food, clothing and adequate housing due to the poverty level. The Red Bird Conference of The United Methodist Church is a missional conference doing what it can in the area. Red Bird Mission offers many support ministries to the area families. The Work Camp and Community Store are only a couple of them.

To support not only the UM families but all families, mission teams from all over the United States go to the Work Camp and volunteer in the many ministries. Due to the many disasters across the country, the number of teams helping has declined and the Work Camp needs help.

Jesus told the disciples to go into the whole world and help. There is much to be done in North Carolina, but we also have to help outside our immediate area. Helping Red Bird Mission Work Camp is a way of fulfilling Jesus' command.

On March 22-28, 2020, I am taking a team to Red Bird that will work on housing needs and in the Community Store. When we go, we take a large trailer load of clothes, household goods and furniture for the Community Store. (We also take loads throughout the year.) This store is where the families do the majority of their shopping.

The cost of the trip is \$550 plus any personal expenses as we travel. There is something for everyone to do regardless of your skill set or age. The trip is a life-changing, God-filled experience.
